Lecturing experience

- 2020– **The Art of Writing and Reporting**, *Lund University*, Teacher.
This is a B.Sc-level course aimed at strengthening the writing skills of the student across a range of styles, thereby providing competencies of practical use for employment or for further study. The course works towards developing the prerequisite skills in writing, primarily obtained through practical training and active practice.
- 2019– **Colonialism and Economic Change in Africa, Asia and Latin America**, *Lund University*, Teacher.
This is a B.Sc-level course that adopts a comparative approach by drawing upon the varying experiences of a number of countries in Africa, Asia, and Latin America between 1500 and 1945.
- 2019– **Development of Emerging Economies**, *Lund University*, Seminar host.
This is an M.Sc-level course that explores developmental issues through historical-theoretical perspectives with the main focus on countries in Pacific Asia, Africa South of the Sahara, and Latin America. It empirically and theoretically assesses the growth of the so-called global South.
- 2019– **Research Design**, *Lund University*, Guest lecturer.
This is an M.Sc-level course that presents the student with research methods generally used in social sciences while focusing on economic history. My participation in the course is limited to hosting seminars where students present their research proposals. The seminars are followed by the grading of the research proposals and feedback to the students.
- 2018– **Field Work/Internship and Research Overview**, *Lund University*, Teacher.
This is a B.Sc-level course that focuses on qualitative and quantitative research methods while ensuring its application on B.Sc thesis. The course consists of three tracks: internship, desk studies, and fieldwork. My role within the course is to expose students to quantitative methods using cross-sectional, time-series, and longitudinal databases.
